


## **Celebrate Thoreau**

with Special Guest Michael Hoberman


Sunday, September 10 at 2 PM FREE and open to the public



Henry David Thoreau described his 1843 walking tour of northern Franklin and Berkshire Counties in his first book, A Week on the Concord and Merrimack Rivers (1849). Somewhere along his meandering westward journey, "in the shade of a maple, where the river had found a broader channel than usual, and was spread out shallow, with frequent sandbars exposed," he stopped to enjoy a noonday nap. Whether or not the picnic area along Rt. 2 in East Charlemont is the exact site where Thoreau snoozed, we will meet there to celebrate Thoreau's legacy and talk about how and why his uniquely detailed and unhurried writing succeeds in capturing the natural beauty of rural New England.



Michael Hoberman is a professor of American literature at Fitchburg State University. He is the author of three books on New England history and culture, including, most recently, New Israel/New England: Jews and Puritans in Early America (UMASS Press, 2011). He is currently writing a book about Jewish American literature and the sense of place, entitled A Hundred Acres of America: The Geography of Jewish American Literary History. The book will be forthcoming from Rutgers University Press in 2019.
